
BEHOLD, I WILL SEND "MY MALACHI"

The term "my messenger" (Ml.3:1) is the same phrase used in Malachi 1:1 where it is used as a proper name, Malachi. Malachi means, "My messenger." Some see this as a play on words, where "Malachi" and "messenger" appear to be interchangeable. This messenger will clear the path for the Lord. As Malachi prepares the way for the coming of the Messiah (as the last book of the OT), so another messenger (John the Baptist / Elijah, Mk.1:2; Ml.4:5) will clear the way when He actually arrives at His first Coming.
