## OLD MAN — NEW MAN — FLESH

- I <u>have been crucified</u> with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but <u>Christ lives in me</u>; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me. (**Ga.2:20**)
- knowing this, that our <u>old man was crucified</u> with Him, that the <u>body of sin</u> might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin. (**Ro.6:6**)
- <sup>9</sup>Do not lie to one another, since you have put off the <u>old man</u> with his deeds, <sup>10</sup> and have put on the <u>new man</u> who is renewed in knowledge according to the image of Him who created him, (Cl.3:9-10)
- <sup>23</sup>But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is <u>in my members</u>. <sup>24</sup>O wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this <u>body of death</u>? (**Ro.7:23-24**)
- Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new. (2Co.5:17)

## D MAN - SELF

## **COMES FROM ADAM**

- 1. Adam gives you this desire to sin.
- 2. After salvation, Adam no longer influences you to sin.
- The old self is our old, <u>unregenerate nature</u>. It is dead. It is crucified (**Ro.6:6; Ga.2:20**) by God.
- The old man <u>cannot be reformed</u>. That is why it must be <u>crucified</u>, and we must be <u>born again</u>.
- The old man is what you were in Adam. All are born with a sin nature.

## **COMES FROM OUR EXPERIENCES**

- 1. Your experiences give you your desire to sin.
- 2. After salvation, your main influence to sin comes from your flesh.

VS

- The new man's <u>desire to do right</u> collides with evil desires of our flesh. Therein lies the battle.
- If you're not a Christian, there is no battle!
- The new man lives in this <u>incarceration of</u> <u>unredeemed flesh</u> (Ro.7:24) awaiting the rapture.

**EW MAN** 

- The new man is the regenerate man and receives a new "divine nature" (2Pe.1:3-4). We are "born again".
- At the new birth, when the old man was crucified (**Ga.2:20**), the power of sin that reigned over us was broken. Sin no longer controls the whole man but it does hold captive the <u>believer's members</u> (fleshly body, **Ro.7:18,23**).
- Why do we fall into sin? Because we do not feed the new man with the Word of God.
- The old man no longer exists. You're a whole new creation (2Co.5:17). You're never exhorted to put off the old man. Why? He is already dead (Ro.6:6; Ga.2:20; Cl.3:9-10). It is not in the process of being crucified. It is dead!
- If the old man had never been crucified with Christ, none of us could deal with the flesh.
